

CELEBRATING NATIONAL CHEMISTRY WEEK!



Students have had a fantastic week participating in a whole host of activities to celebrate National Chemistry Week.

As part of chemistry week at SJNGC, over 100 students attended lunchtime sessions hosted by Science teachers and led by student ambassadors in KS4. The theme celebrated was "Chemistry - making the world a better place". The activities that students took part in

involved making alginate worms, creating seed bombs, and investigating the role of emulsifiers.

Additionally, during the week a scavenger hunt activity was set up around the college. Students had to find as many Scientists as possible, learning about their inventions, across the site, all of which contributed towards making the world a better place.









This is what a KS4 student ambassador had to say about the week.

"This week, SJNGC has held its annual Chemistry week; this has included a multitude of experiments with the intention of encouraging global sustainability. As a year 11 student, participating in Chemistry week has been an opportunity to develop both leadership and communication skills whilst also encouraging younger students to consider how they can use Chemistry to contribute towards climate change solutions. We helped younger students create seed bombs - recycled cardboard spheres with seeds placed in them — and explained how an increased number of plants would result in a reduction of carbon dioxide levels in our atmosphere. Furthermore, we conducted an experiment involving the emulsification of oils to prompt students to consider methods to combat oil spills in the ocean. Personally, I felt it was a good opportunity to encourage those interested in chemistry to peruse it further and to consider how they can act against climate change. Overall, this year's Chemistry week has been a great experience for all involved."



The college would like to say a huge thank you to Mrs Yusuf for organising and arranging these activities, all science staff and student ambassadors who gave up their time to deliver the lunchtime activities and Mrs Vyas for organising and conducting the scavenger hunt.







SPEAK UP!



SJNGC are proud to be working with partner theatres Curve Leicester and National Theatre London as one of the five regional schools participating in Speak Up. The scheme was set up by The National Theatre following the pandemic with the aim of providing young people an opportunity to share their voice and Speak Up about things that are important to them. We are now in the second year of the three-year project and were fortunate to have two members of staff attend a weekend visit to the Big Speak Up Get Together. This was an opportunity to meet with teachers and practitioners across the country to see how the project has been working in their schools and centres.

Whilst at the event we were given an excellent presentation by the speak up council – this is a group that were selected form all participatory regions who sit together to shape and advocate for all the young people who are involved in the project. The group of 15 young people presented at the National Theatre to over 100 representatives from the partner theatres and schools. Sir Jonathan North are proud to have Isobel in year 10 selected as part of the Speak Up Council. She spoke so eloquently and passionately on what must have

been a very high pressure and nerve-wracking national platform.

A natural olive oil soap was used to felt the pictures together which involved agitating the fibres by rolling them. The soap was then washed out and the pictures dried.

SJN HOSTS ECO SCHOOLS ROADSHOW!

On the 15th November we held an eco roadshow at Sir Jonathan North. Beauchamp College, Knighton mead

Primary and our eco club attended three workshops on the day. The first session we went to was Saving Soil. Did you know that 1 acre of forest gets turned into farmland every second? It takes 500 years just to make one inch of good quality soil. We learnt about why it was important for us to protect soil. We then looked at our wildlife in college during the Wildlife in our School Grounds session. We studied a map of our college to identify places where we could increase the amount of wildlife. Then we carried out a bug hunt to see what wildlife we had. We found a hibernating baby newt, an adult newt and various insects. Our final session was led by Leicester Space Centre. We learnt about how satellites can monitor changes to the land and how our carbon footprint is important. We discovered that beef and poultry have the highest carbon footprint whilst fruit and vegetables have the lowest.

The roadshow was so much fun and has made us even more passionate about climate change and making a difference to our environment.




BOOK CHAT CLUB!

wrote HappyHead and posted it on his social media. Well done Isla, year 10.





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

As you are aware—attendance matters!

Without a regular patter of attendance, students struggle to maintain an effective routine and do not perform as well as their peers. The following table shows the impact of attendance on the amount of time and lessons that will be lost over an academic year.

At Sir Jonathan North we have high expectations of our students and we ask for your support in ensuring that students comply with our uniform requirements which are fully detailed here:



Here are some key reminders for the start of the new term:

- ⇒ Pleated skirts are to be worn to the knee (not rolled at the waist)
- ⇒ Jewellery (only allowed one pair of stud earrings and a watch). Nose keepers (plastic clear nose studs) are allowed. No other jewellery.
- ⇒ False lashes—need to be removed
- ⇒ False nails/acrylics—need to be removed or cut down

- ⇒ Weather-proof coat—no hoodies/cardigans






